#### WITH MARY TOWARDS THE SYNODAL ASSEMBLY

At the request of the Holy Father, the Secretariat responsible for the Universal Synod has invited the Church around the world to hold a moment of Marian Prayer on 31st May (the Feast of the Visitation) to place the work of the Synod under the protection of Our Lady. An open invitation is being extended to all to join us on this day in Knock, Ireland's International Eucharistic and Marian Shrine.

Conscious not everyone will be able to travel to Knock, we encourage you to pray with us at the Angelus times of 12 noon and 6pm (or at a time that's convenient for you) as we continue to strengthen our communion, deepen our participation, and enlarge our mission. Please do share this resource widely so others can pray with us and seek the interceding presence of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God and Mother of the Church.

Sacrament of the Sick: the Church has always understood this sacrament as a continuation of the healing ministry of Jesus. However, by the twelfth century, the sacrament related to dying, perhaps because of peoples' preoccupation with "saving our souls", and the last chance for sins to be forgiven. As a result, it was referred to as "extreme" or final "unction" or anointing. This meant that a priest would be present to administer extreme unction and to pray for our soul. Today, the connection between this sacrament and dying is still strong. Many people believe that when a person is anointed with the Oil of the Sick they are nearing the end of life. However, it rather connects us with the healing ministry of Jesus, who laid his hands on the sick and prayed over them. The Laying on of Hands is central to the celebration of the sacrament and, as priests, we do this before the anointing with the oil. Throughout scripture there are references to healing – in the Letter of James, St. Paul's letter to the Corinthians and in the Gospels. While many still see this sacrament as an end of life moment, people can receive it at various times in their life – prior to surgery, for healing of the mind as well as the body, in case of death and so

In our parish, the annual Sacrament of the Sick will be celebrated in **St. Patrick's Church** at **12 noon** on **Saturday 27**<sup>th</sup> **May**. This is an opportunity for those who may be elderly or housebound to come and receive the anointing and to celebrate the Eucharist. Please inform your family, friends or neighbours and indeed, perhaps you might bring somebody with you to the Mass. Refreshments will be served in the Community centre afterwards.

Candlemas, Lady Day; but the Lady Month, May, why fasten that upon her, with a feasting in her honour?

Is it only it's been brighter than the most and must delight her? is it opportunist and flowers find soonest?

Ask of her, the mighty mother: her reply puts this other question: What is Spring? – growth in everything.

Flesh and fleece, fur and feather, grass and green world all together; star-eyed strawberry-breasted throstle above her nested.

Cluster of bugle blue eggs thin forms and warms the life within; and bird and blossom swell in sod or sheath or shell.

All things rising, all things sizing Mary sees, sympathising with the world of good, nature's motherhood.

Their magnifying of each its kind with delight calls to mind, how she did in her stored magnify the Lord.

Well but there was more than this: Spring's universal bliss much, had much to say to offering Mary May.

When drop-of-blood-and-foamdapple bloom lights the orchardapple and thicket and thorp are merry with silver-surfed cherry.

And azuring-over greybell makes wood banks and brakes wash wet like lakes and magic cuckoo call caps, clears, and clinches all.

This ecstasy all through mothering earth tells Mary her mirth till Christ's birth to remember and exultation in God who was her salvation.
